



After our meal we were treated to a very interesting presentation by our guest speaker Andrew Yen. Andrew is a teacher at Luther College but his road to the one of teacher is a very circuitous one. When Andrew was ten years old his family inherited his grandfather's telescope. It was promptly erected it in the back yard and from the moment he looked through it and saw Jupiter in all its glory, rings and all he was hooked on astronomy. He built an "observatory" – basically a shed with a roof that opened so he could look at the sky at night. If his mother couldn't find him anywhere she knew he would be in the back yard looking through the telescope.



Andrew went to university and studies engineering but his love of

asronomy underpinned all his spare time. Eventually he joined the Astronomical Society and started going to night time functions with other members when they would put their telescopes up and look at the stars together. He became onvolved in building observatories via not for profit agencies and helping schools in particular. Eltham College designed and built one that used a robotic telescope that enabled the students to access it from their computers whereever they were. At this stage the telescope malfuncioned and Andrew was employed to help them solve the problem – when they opened it up they discoovered a naughty lizard had taken up residence and by licking all the electronic parts made it non funcional. At this stage it was suggested that Andrew study to become a teacher – which he did and he is now emplyed at Luther College.

He has enabled the students, via their robotic telescope to really get involved in astronomy and some of his students have actually discovered previously unknown stars. They are able to network around the world and tap into various telescopes in other countries via their computers and others around the world can access their telescope. He said it was a bit of a fragile operation because they malfuncion regularly!

However it has revolutionised the teaching of astronomy to students and enabled them to become as passionate as Andrew.

Andrew is about to embark on a trip to a triennial Astronomy conference in South Africa in August where he will be the first non professional astronomer to give a paper. Our Rotary club has assisted in the funding of this trip and he expressed his gratitude to the club for that. We look forward to hearing more from Andrew on his return from the trip. He is particularly interested in dark energy which he talked about as a concept. There were some interesting questions fielded by Chair Liz Guiver.

It was a great evening and we hope our guests enjoyed it as much as we did.

What is the Polio Plus Society?

It is a Rotary fundraising and recognition program that specifically supports Polio eradication.

Why the eradication of Polio?

Rotary International is a founding member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Polio is a paralysing and potentially deadly infectious disease. The virus spreads from person to person, typically through contaminated water. It can then attack the nervous system.

Isn't Polio virtually eradicated anyway?

Whilst it remains endemic only in two countries, Pakistan and Afghanistan If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyse as many as 200,000 children each year.

What is the commitment to become a member of the Polio Plus Society?
